COMMODORE'S MESSAGE

I can't believe the summer has vanished so quickly and that autumn is upon us once again. I suspect that its apparent sudden passage may have something to do with the metaphoric passage of summer to autumn of one's life. In any event, we are faced with the conclusion of another fiscal year, the commencement of the 1982-83 year and a November Annual Meeting.

There are a number of things which will fall into place prior to the Annual Meeting. In the first instance, we have scheduled a Committee Meeting at the Club House on October 18th at 8:00 P.M. and would invite Committee Chairpersons to attend.

In the second instance, we have decided to take advantage of the lowering of the lake and have scheduled a Clean-up Sunday for October 17th. I call upon each of you, particularly the boaters and bathers, to join us in attempting to clean up the beach and dock areas. I am told that refreshments of sorts will be served.

In the third instance, I would like to call your attention to the Annual Meeting which has been scheduled for Friday, November 12th. There are a significant number of matters which will be addressed at the Annual Meeting and I would be preased if you would take the time to join us then.

Lastly, let me note that we have scheduled an appreciation evening for November 6th at the Club and are inviting all members who have worked in any capacity for the Club this year. We are endeavoring to extend our thanks to those members who have taken time to assist us on the clean-up weekends, boat races and the various other activities requiring participation. You will, I am sure, receive more information about that, either elsewhere in this Porthole or by separate notice.

Ken Leach has asked me to extend to you our thanks for your help, cooperation and consideration in making this a successful, secure and safe year.

I would also personally extend thanks on behalf of the Trustees to those members who assisted in making the Regatta an apparently successful event in 1982. Ed Ross, it appears, has more than risen to the occasion. I can also report that Doug Hartmann was successful in soliciting the most new ads for the Regatta Book and has won the prize of Dinner for Two at the Italian Chalet. The youngsters who had solicited boosters for the ad book have also been rewarded.

Let me now turn to the matters which are presently on hand and which will be discussed more fully at the Annual Meeting.

With the lake being lowered, we have committed ourselves to cleaning up the swimming area. We have also decided, as a part of that project, to remove the white poles along the beach and replace them next year with floating lines. The swimming area will also be given a new surface of white sand to improve its condition and to retard future weed growth. We expect also to extend the air lines installed this year to provide additional aeration for the swimming area. There are a few other things which will be done in respect to that undertaking.

This year we have worked within the budget which was prepared prior to the beginning of the 1981-82 year. We have received monthly progress reports on our budgetary expenses. I am pleased to report that our anticipated expenses for the year were within several hundred dollars of our actual expenses for the year. Although we spent considerable sums of your money, I believe that the results have been manifest. There is, I trust, attached to this Porthole a schedule of our income and disbursements for the year 1981-82. Please note that the figures are as yet unaudited However, we believe they are fairly accurate. Our audited statement should be available for the Annual Meeting.

I believe there is also attached to this Porthole a copy of our Proposed Budget for 1982-83. The Proposed Budget gives rise to a request for a modest dues increase of 20%. The Proposed Budget also includes completion of the renovation of the Club House. We have not made any decisions on committing ourselves to complete those renovations, but rather have decided to leave to the membership the choice of doing that this year. Completion of that project would require an additional assessment of \$40.00 per member family. We will undertake a vote on that on the evening of the Annual Meeting.

One of the other things which we have done this year is to create as an expense which we have called, for want of a better term, a Major Expense/Emergency Fund. We have contributed an average of \$425.00 per month to that fund in an effort to accumulate monies to be used for the purpose of major expenses which seem to arise so frequently. It is our hope that with such a budgetary item, we can, in the future, reduce the need to request special assessments for the purposes of completing major projects. We have built in to the next year's budget that item as an expense and hope that the next board views that as a provident goal. The approximate \$5,000.00 in that fund is reflected in our "Cash on Hand" position at the end of the 1982 Fiscal Year. The new budget reflects projected anticipated income for the 1982-83 year of \$127,300.00, which sum includes the requested dues increase and assessment. Our anticipated projected expenses, including \$3,000.00 of Accounts Payable left over from 1982, totals \$138,000.00. The deficit between those two figures is projected to be made up with current cash on hand of \$11,000.00. The \$11,000.00 figure results from subtracting \$5,000.00 (Major Expense Fund) from the \$16,000.00 total cash on hand. If we approve the assessment and the dues increase and undertake all of

the expenses set forth in the budget, we should still conclude next year with \$10,000.00 left in the Major Expense Fund. We have endeavored to be guided in the selection of projects for the upcoming year by the work of the Five-year Planning Committee. We have also endeavored to plan our budget in order to accommodate the anticipated projects suggested in the future by the Five-year Planning Committee.

I think you will agree that our financial sacrifices this year have been worth the effort. Whether we continue to improve the premises in respect to the completion of the Club will be left to you as members. In either event, please come to the meeting and provide us with your thoughts in that respect.

One of the other items on the agenda will be the adoption of amended and revised by-laws. A copy of the Proposed By-laws has also been attached to this Porthole or will be sent out under separate cover, depending upon logistics. The proposed form is the result of approximately two years of work. It is our eventual intention to include the By-laws and regulations of the Club and beach and docks as well as pertinent portions of the Master Lease in booklet form for circulation to all the members.

We have proposed amendments to the existing By-laws for reasons which I will attempt to outline briefly here. The proposed amendments are to some extent technical, semantical and result from practical difficulties which we have experienced over the years. We have proposed a change from Family Membership to Household Membership for reasons which are probably obvious and which created inequities over the years. The prospective classes of membership are limited to two, voting and non-voting, and are otherwise in substance the same as before. We have proposed the deletions of the provision requiring new members to be bondholders. We have in the next instance simply rearticulated our established procedure for suspension and termination of membership. We have, in Article 4, proposed the removal of the dues structure from the By-laws and proposed that they be adopted by Trustee approval. In respect to that, there is a provision proposed in the By-laws proscribing a dues increase of 10% of the prior year without membership approval. We have removed dues from the By-laws to obviate the inequities which arise when a new family moves in, for example in mid-year. Under the present system both families are required to pay dues for the entire year. Under the proposed system, the dues can be apportioned by the Club between the family moving out and the family moving in. In another area respecting meetings, we have provided for two membership meetings and proposed a change of date from November to December of the Primary Meeting in order to assure that our audited statements will be available to us prior to the meeting. We have also included some clarification with respect to the procedure of special meetings called by the members. We have added a Treasurer's Report as one of the orders of business at the Annual Meeting. We have also provided that decisions made by the Trustees shall not thereafter be amended or modified except upon affirmative vote of five of the Trustees. We have also provided for

certain limitations upon the Trustees' powers and have endeavored to clarify the project expenditures which can be undertaken without membership approval. We have also included a provision that the Secretary and Treasurer, in that order, succeed to the obligations of the Commodore in his or her absence. In general, we have attempted to streamline the By-laws and make them appropriate for the practical administration of the Club's affairs.

Please be kind enough to review the proposed By-laws, as their adoption will be one of the subjects discussed at the meeting. Time and space has not provided me to elaborate on every proposed change. We will be happy to entertain any questions with respect to the proposed changes at the Annual Meeting.

Again, I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the events which we have scheduled.

*Please note that actual retained cash on hand at the end of year 1982 was approximately \$16,000. We have created this year a separate Major Expense/Emergency Fund to which we have contributed an average of \$425. per month. This has totalled approximately \$5,000. by year's end and is included in our year-end "Cash on Hand" account. We have prepared next year's budget to provide for a similar fund, so that by year-end 1983, we should have a total of approximately \$10,000. in that fund. This has been an attempt at creating a fund on a continuing basis to which recorse may be had for funding major projects or defraying emergency expenses without the continued necessity of resorting to requests for special assessments.

NEWSWATCH

Elections - Nov. 2, 1982 - Locally two council seats and the mayoralty are due to expire. The incumbent candidates for the Jefferson Twp. Council are John Moran and Pat Curran while Frank McBride and Bob Kramer hope to unseat them. Mayor Horace Chamberlain is being challenged for his seat by Councilman Jim Opeken.

One issue in the municipal elections which should be of great interest to Lake Forest residents regards Liffy Island, the large undeveloped island directly across from the Lake Forest Yacht Club. Portions of the island were taken by the township through foreclosure earlier this year. But the majority of the areage is owned by Estates Equity Co. and Consumer Coal Co. The Lake Hopatcong Regional Planning Board has recommended those portions be acquired and joined with Jefferson tracts for use as a "natural park". (A "passive" or "natural" park provides things such as picnic tables and hiking trails as opposed by basketball or tennis courts or boat launching areas.) Whether the land should be purchased outright by the town and/or the county park system or allowed to be developed for residential use has become a 1982 political issue. The Democratic candidates on the local and county level are taking a strong stand for acquisition and preservation. The Republican candidates contacted thus far have chosen not to take a stand on the island.

In its continuing quest for a new landfill site the Morris County Solid
Waste Advisory Council has accepted a consultants report which recommends a Roxbury site. The sole site recommendedby Terraqua Resources,
Corp. of Reading, Pa. lies atop a bluff overlooking Lake Hopatcong
and Lake Muscenetcong where rts 46 and 80 intersect.
